#### Conway School Board Report - September 11, 2023

#### Introduction:

This report highlights the recent activities and achievements of high school students in the Conway School District, with a specific focus on Career & Technical Education (CTE) programs. These programs play a crucial role in preparing students for future careers by providing hands-on experiences and specialized knowledge.

#### School to Career Summer Camps (Joe Riddensdale):

The MWV School to Career Partnership week-long summer camps are designed to introduce local middle school youth to the variety of programs offered at KHS/MWVCTC and career opportunities available in the valley. This coalition between the Mt. Washington Valley business community and the nine area schools in SAU#9 and #13, MSAD 72, and Fryeburg Academy has made this one of the most successful summers ever. Most camps are for middle school youth entering grades 7, 8, or 9. The FAA ACE Camp for STEM Aviation is available to youth entering grades 8, 9, or 10. Thanks to a generous grant, each week-long program was FREE for all students in 2023, and all camps were filled. In addition to the FAA ACE Camp, the following camps were offered: Photography, Mission to Mars, Robotics, Culinary, Construction, Health, and a "Sampler Camp" for 5th and 6th graders in cooperation with Project Succeed. New this year was the addition of an Outdoor Recreation camp offering basic wilderness first aid topics and CPR, flat water canoeing, whitewater canoeing, river safety and rescue skills, and whitewater kayaking.

## 2022-23 Outdoor Recreation Career Pathway Accomplishments

**Introduction:** This report highlights the significant achievements of the Outdoor Recreation (OR) Career Pathway at the Mt. Washington Valley Career & Technical Center (MWVCTC) during the 2022-23 academic year. These accomplishments demonstrate the successful implementation of the OR program and the valuable partnerships established with industry leaders and organizations.

- 1. Establishment of the OR Advisory Committee: The OR Advisory Committee was formed with over 25 members representing various segments of the OR industry, including prominent organizations such as Stan & Dan's Ski & Bike, Gorham Bike & Ski, Cranmore Mt. Resort, Omni Mt. Washington Resort, US Forest Service, NH Fish & Game, Appalachian Mountain Club, Upper Saco Valley Land Trust, Granite Outdoor Alliance, and others. The committee played a crucial role in developing curriculum scope and sequence modules that align with the recently established Outdoor Recreation Career Pathways by the NH Department of Education. (see OR Competency Crosswalk & Modules document)
- 2. Pilot OR Career Pathway Program: MWVCTC became the first career and technical center in New Hampshire to offer OR Career Pathway programming. A large classroom was outfitted with equipment, supplies, bikes, and other resources worth over \$65,000 to support the inaugural bike technician class. This was possible through funding from the federal Perkins Innovation grant, the University of New Hampshire (UNH), and the Granite Outdoor Alliance.
- 3. Project Bike Tech (PBT) Certification: The first PBT class, consisting of 17 students, completed the semester-long course. Project Bike Tech, an accredited program focused on bicycle education, serves as a conduit to teach STEM principles. Students who completed the course obtained PBT Level I Bike Mechanic certification. Encouraged by the success, a second PBT class with 19 enrolled students is scheduled for the upcoming 2023-24 school year. Additionally, in collaboration with Tri-County Cap and NH's Outdoor Mobility Office, the Bike Tech program repaired 25 donated bicycles to provide free bikes to community members in need, offering valuable work-based learning opportunities to students.
- 4. Wilderness First Aid Class: MWVCTC organized a two-day Wilderness First Aid class at SOLO, where 12 students acquired WFA certification. This program will be offered each semester in the coming school year.
- 5. CAST/UNH's Outdoor Youth Research Project: Ten students actively participated in the CAST/UNH's Outdoor Youth research project in the fall of 2022. This full-day event at the Highland Center in Crawford Notch involved beta-testing an app designed to identify STEM skills and learning within outdoor activities. The project aims to help rural learners develop STEM skills, paving the way for high-wage, high-skill STEM careers. As a result, this event initiated a year-long partnership between the researchers and students. This partnership involves ongoing app usage and monthly check-ins. In October 2023, both researchers and students will meet again at the Highland Center. The purpose will be to review data and establish an action plan for the upcoming 2023-24 school year. Initially initiated by the NH Charitable Foundation, the National Science Foundation now supports the project.

- 6. Contribution to Recreation Economies: MWVCTC enthusiastically supports the U.S. Department of Agriculture's plan to expand recreation economies in rural America. Through a Memorandum of Understanding, MWVCTC collaborates with USDA Rural Development, the USDA National Institute of Food and Agriculture, and the U.S. Forest Service to develop an annual plan that fosters economic opportunities related to recreation in communities surrounding national forests. This initiative aims to benefit communities, public health, and economic development.
- 7. Student Opportunities and Recognitions: MWVCTC provided numerous opportunities to engage in outdoor recreation. These included a two-day ice climbing adventure during February vacation week, facilitated by International Mountain Climbing Guides, emphasizing safety awareness and personal responsibility. Additionally, students participated in the Diamond 48 Film Festival, collaborating with Granite Outdoor Alliance and the Mount Washington Back Country Ski Festival organizers. Their action film, "How Ya Feeling?" tied for 1st place, showcasing their backcountry skiing and video storytelling skills.
- 8. Senator Jeanne Shaheen's Visit: Senator Jeanne Shaheen visited MWVCTC, touring the Pine Hill Community Forest's latest trails and meeting with representatives from the outdoor recreation industry. She interacted with Project Bike Tech students, demonstrating their newly acquired skills. These students also actively contributed to the development of the mountain bike trail system alongside renowned professional trail builder Matt Coughlin.
- 9. Outdoor Recreation Summer Camp: The first OR camp debuted this summer. The twelve spots available were filled immediately. Students attending this five-day camp in July include learning basic wilderness first aid topics and CPR, flat water canoeing, whitewater canoeing, river safety and rescue skills, and whitewater kayaking. Students may earn a CPR card, an American Canoe Association Essentials of River Safety and Rescue card.
- 10. **MWVCTC's Construction Trades:** Students built three kiosks for the partially opened Mount Washington Valley Rec Path, welcoming visitors at designated entry points.
- 11. **NH Charitable Foundation (NHCF) Grant:** In July 2023, MWVCTC applied for and received a \$10,000 grant from the NHCF to further develop our Outdoor Recreation program for the upcoming school year and summer camp 2024.

Conclusion: The 2022-23 academic year was filled with remarkable achievements for the Outdoor Recreation Career Pathway program at MWVCTC. The establishment of the OR Advisory Committee, the successful implementation of the OR program, and students' engagement in experiential learning opportunities have solidified MWVCTC's position as a pioneering institution in outdoor recreation education. The continued collaboration with industry partners and the pursuit of innovation will further enhance the program's impact in the coming years.
